"REPORT IT!" CAMPAIGN

The PSB is excited to announce the launch of its "Report It!" campaign in all schools on October 18, aiming to empower students to report school-related incidents and ensure they can do so in a manner that is most comfortable for them. The "Report It!" campaign will focus on promoting the importance of reporting school related incidents such as bullying, theft and violence while reinforcing the message that students should inform their parents, guardians, teachers, school counsellors, principals or other trusted adults when they need support. Recognizing the diverse preferences of students, the campaign will offer multiple reporting options, including verbal, written and online methods. The online form, a new and innovative approach, allows students to submit reports anonymously, offering them an additional layer of privacy and security. Similar reporting options have been successfully implemented in other jurisdictions across the country.

FREE FAMILY LITERACY PROGRAM IN CHARLOTTETOWN

My name is Emily Cook-McDonald, and I am the Project Manager of the UPEI Faculty of Education's Literacy Outreach Project. Our endeavor was born out of a shared understanding that many island families could benefit from sustained support in literacy & numeracy education. After receiving a generous donation to kickstart our project, we have begun to offer many new programs for children and families across the province. Please find enclosed a poster for our free family library program: Playing with Stories. I hope that you might consider referring families to our program – we want to make sure our sessions are full of families, especially those who would appreciate this support.

Playing with Stories is a program for children aged 2 – 8 years and their parents/caregivers. (Baby siblings are also welcome to join!) In partnership with the Public Library Service & the Charlottetown Learning Library Centre, this program will run for ten weeks from October 15, 2023, until December 19, 2023. Families must register for one of two separate times: Sunday afternoons from 1:30pm – 3:00 pm and Tuesday evenings from 5:00pm until 6:30pm. We also provide a free snack/meal following the program and can coordinate transportation for families who need it if requested.

EYE SEE ... EYE LEARN PROGRAM

To ensure children get the best possible start to their education, the Eye See ... Eye Learn™ program provides one free eye exam and, if required, one free pair of glasses during their kindergarten year.

Please note: The PEI Association of Optometrists and eyewear sponsors, VisionTech Labs PEI and Viva Canada have partnered with Health PEI to offer this eye health and vision



awareness program for kindergarten children. Why is it important for my child to have an eye exam?

When children start school, 80 per cent of their classroom learning is through vision. Regular eye exams give them the start they need to reach their learning potential. Eye exams can identify health problems and conditions such as a turned or lazy eye. These conditions may be successfully treated if they are identified early in a child's life. It is recommended that infants should have their first eye exam at six months of age.

How do I register my child for an eye exam?

- 1. Book an appointment with an optometrist for your kindergarten child.
- 2. Bring your child's PEI Health Card and private insurance information with you to the appointment.
- 3. If your optometrist is unable to bill your insurance provider directly, you will have to pay up front and be reimbursed. Submit your claim to your insurance provider, then complete and submit an application for co-pay reimbursement [PDF | 70 KB] to Health PEI for the remaining amount.

If you don't have insurance, complete and sign a Declaration form [PDF | 70 KB]. Your optometrist will not ask you to pay for the exam and glasses, if required, as they are covered by Health PEI and the PEI Association of Optometrists.
